YOU May be Able to Get Disaster Assistance

FEMA and the State can provide assistance to:

U.S. Citizens, Non-Citizen Nationals, and Qualified Residents

WHO IS A QUALIFIED RESIDENT?



If you have a legal permanent resident card USCIS Form I-551 or "green card."

If you have legal residence status because of:

- asylum
- refugee status
- conditional entry
- withholding of deportation
- domestic violence against spouses or children
- immigration from Cuba or Haiti
- severe forms of human trafficking, including persons with "T" and "U" visas

Declaration of Eligibility

When you apply, you will sign a declaration that says you or your child is a citizen, a non-citizen national, or a qualified resident.

Applying for FEMA disaster assistance will not affect your eligibility to become a U.S. citizen.






- If you have a temporary tourist, student or work visa.
